

# Post-operative Instructions Urologist Dr Devang Desai

If your procedure involves general or sedative anaesthetic, you must not drive for 24 hours after anaesthetic and you must have a support person with you the night of your procedure. This is a legal requirement stated in your anaesthetic consent which is included in your admission documents for the hospital.

Please also ensure you have made a review appointment with your surgeon after your surgery. Time frames vary for this so please contact us after your procedure if you are unsure when to book in.

\*If you are a public outsourced patient, the Toowoomba Hospital will contact you with information regarding your review appointments.

## Healing

To help you heal quicker, in the first 48 hours post procedure:

- o Rest and avoid constipation
- o Do not participate in labour intensive work or exercise

Additional instructions for penile, scrotal and vasectomy procedures

- o Use ice packs to help with swelling (do not apply directly to skin)
- o Use scrotal support ie firm fitting underwear

In the two weeks after your procedure, you can return to work on light duties. Do not participate in heavy lifting, pushing/ pulling movements or other labour intensive work.

## **Side Effects**

Specific side effects for each procedure have been discussed with you at your consultation. We have listed the most common side effects below.

\* If you are a public outsourced patient, please contact your local GP or visit Toowoomba Hospital's Emergency Department if you develop any uncommon side effects.

#### **Common side effects**

- o Urine with a rose or pink tinge which should clear within 3 days post procedure
- o Pain which can be managed with Paracetamol or Nurofen
- $\circ~$  Avoid constipation this will help with pain and healing
- Stinging or burning when passing urine can be relieved with Ural (available from your pharmacy) or by adding lemon or lime to your drinking water

#### **Uncommon side effects**

Seek medical attention through Toowoomba Specialists, your local GP or your local Hospital's Emergency Department. **Note:** If you take blood thinners, please **DO NOT** take any further doses until you have sought medical attention.

- Dark red or wine coloured urine
- o Passing blood clots through your urine
- o Fevers, chills, shakes or tremors
- o Unmanageable pain
